History of The AME Church - Our Beginning

On a Sunday in November 1787, when Richard Allen and other worshippers arrived at St. George Methodist Church, they were ordered into new segregated seats in the gallery. Several blacks were threatened and shoved while in the midst of prayer. When prayer was over, Allen's group rose and left the church. They never returned.

After the walkout, angered white elders threatened to strip the blacks of membership. In response, Allen began to raise funds for a new church.

In 1793, Richard Allen bought an old blacksmith shop and converted it into FIRST BETHEL CHURCH, the first place of worship owned by Africans in America. Denied the right to preach in Bethel, the white elders brought their case to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania. The court ruled that Bethel was free to control its own religious affairs.

Shortly after the court ruling, in April 1816, a conference of black churches was called (Philadelphia, Baltimore, Wilmington, Attleboro, Pennsylvania and Salem, New Jersey). There the African Methodist Episcopal Church was formed. Richard Allen was ordained an Elder and consecrated first Bishop of the new church.

History of The AME Church - The Meaning of A M E C

<u>AFRICAN</u>: In Richard Allen's day, black people were generally called Africans. They formed the church and were its earliest members. Today, the church is open to all.

<u>METHODIST</u>: The polity of our church is Methodist. Richard Allen felt the need for the excellent organization and structure of Methodism.

<u>EPISCOPAL</u>: This refers to the form of government under which the church operates. The General Conference elects Bishops, who in turn make pastoral appointments, ordain deacons, and elders and supervise the work of the church.

<u>CHURCH</u>: The Christian Church is a community of people who have accepted Jesus Christ as the guide and master of their lives. They believe that God, through Christ, can transform each believer.

<u>Twenty-Five of Articles of Religion prepared by John Wesley (A brief</u> summary)

- 1. <u>ON FAITH IN THE HOLY TRINITY</u> There is one true God, the maker and preserver of all things. Father, Son, and Holy Ghost are one God, who is known as the Trinity.
- 2. <u>ON THE WORD OR SON OF GOD, WHO WAS MADE VERY MAN</u> Jesus, the divine Son of God, was born of the Virgin Mary, was crucified, dead and buried for the sin of man.
- 3. <u>OF THE RESURRECTION OF CHRIST</u> Jesus Christ arose from the dead and ascended into heaven. He will return at the last day to judge all men.
- 4. <u>OF THE HOLY GHOST</u> The Holy Spirit came from the Father and Son and is one with them in the Trinity.
- 5. <u>THE SUFFICIENCY OF THE HOLY SCRIPTURE FOR SALVATION</u> The Holy Scriptures of the Bible contain all truth necessary for salvation.
- 6. <u>OF THE OLD TESTAMENT</u> The ancient rites and ceremonies of the Old Testament do not bind Christians. However, its moral teachings should be obeyed.
- 7. <u>OF THE ORIGINAL OR BIRTH OF SIN</u> Original sin is the evil in man's nature which he inherits.
- 8. <u>OF FREE WILL</u> The free will of man must have divine help in order that he does good and pleases God.

PART FOUR CONTINUED — ADDITIONAL CDMC CURRICULUM

<u>Twenty-Five of Articles of Religion prepared by John Wesley Continued (A brief summary)</u>

- 9. <u>OF JUSTIFICATION OF MAN</u> We are justified or pardoned, not by good works but by faith in our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.
- 10. <u>OF GOOD WORKS</u> Good works are the fruits of faith and are pleasing to God
- 11. <u>OF WORKS OF SUPEREROGATION</u> We can never do more good works than God requires.
- 12. <u>THE SIN AFTER JUSTIFICATION</u> If one sins after justification or pardon, he may repent, and it will be forgotten.
- 13. <u>OF THE CHURCH</u> The visible Church of Christ is a congregation of faithful men and women in which the gospel is preached, and the sacraments duly administered
- 14. <u>OF PURGATORY</u> Purgatory is not taught in the Bible, neither is invocation of saints or worshipping images or relics
- 15. <u>OF SPEAKING IN OTHER TONGU</u>ES Prayer and worship in the Christian Church should be in a language the people can understand. To do otherwise is contrary to the Word of God
- 16. <u>OF THE SACRAMENTS</u> Sacraments are badges of Christian profession and signs of God's grace. Christ ordained only two sacraments, Baptism, and the Lord's Supper
- 17. <u>OF BAPTISM</u> Baptism is a sign of Christian profession. Both children and adults are baptized before becoming members of the Church
- 18. <u>OF THE LORD'S SUPPER</u> The sacrament of the Lord's Supper is a sign of brotherly love and also a memorial of Christ's death. It should be observed in a spiritual manner, but not be made an object of worship
- 19. <u>OF BOTH KINDS</u> Both the bread and wine are to be given the people in the Lord's Supper
- 20. <u>OF THE ONE OBLATION OF CHRIST, FINISHED UPON THE CROSS</u> There is no value in masses for the dead. This is a dangerous deceit and is not necessary
- 21. <u>OF THE MARRIAGE OF MINISTERS</u> Ministers may marry at their own discretion

PART FOUR CONTINUED—ADDITIONAL CDMC CURRICULUM

Twenty-Five of Articles of Religion prepared by John Wesley- (A brief summary)

- 22. <u>OF THE RITES AND CEREMONIES OF CHURCHES</u> It is unnecessary to have the same rite and ceremonies in all places. These may be changed to meet the needs of different countries and times
- 23. <u>OF THE RULERS OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA</u> This article states the authority and independence of our national government
- 24. <u>OF CHRISTIAN MEN'S GOODS</u> Christians may possess private property, but they should give liberally to the Church and to the poor
- 25. *OF A CHRISTIAN MAN'S OATH* A Christian may swear when magistrate requires it, without violating the teachings of the Bible

AME Structure of Church

The African Methodist Episcopal Church is a connectional organization. Each local church is a part of the larger connection.

The Bishops are the Chief Officers of the Connectional Organization. They are elected for life by a majority vote of the General Conference which meets every four years. Bishops are bound by the laws of the church to retire upon the General Conference nearest their 75th birthday.


Presiding Elders are the assistants, like middle management, whom the Bishops appoint to supervise the preachers in a Presiding Elder's District. A Presiding Elder District is one portion of an Annual Conference which in turn is one part of the Episcopal District over which a Bishop presides.

In the Presiding Elder District, the appointed Presiding Elder meets with the local churches, which comprise the District, at least once every three months for a Quarterly Conference. The Presiding Elder also presides over a District Conference and a Sunday School Convention in his or her District. At the end of an Annual Conference year, the Presiding Elder reports to the Bishop at the Annual Conference and makes recommendations for pastoral appointments

Pastors receive a yearly appointment to a charge (church), on the recommendation of the Presiding Elder and with the approval and final appointment of the Bishop. The pastor is in full charge of the Church and is an ex-official member of all boards, organizations, and clubs of that Church.

The General Conference

The General Conference is the supreme body of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. It is composed of the Bishops, as exofficio presidents, according to the rank of election, and an equal number of ministerial and lay delegates, elected by each of the Annual Conferences and the Lay Electoral Colleges of the Annual Conferences. Other ex-officio members are the General Officers, College Presidents, Deans/Presidents of Theological Seminaries, Judicial Council and other persons listed in the General Conference Composition.

Council Of Bishops

The Council of Bishops is the Executive Branch of the Connectional Church. It has the general oversight of the Church during the interim of General Conferences. The Council of Bishops shall meet annually at such time and place as the majority of Council shall determine and also at such other times as may be deemed necessary in the discharging its responsibility as the Executive Branch of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. The Council of Bishops shall hold at least two public sessions at each annual meeting. At the first, complaints and petitions against a Bishop shall be heard, at the second, the decisions of the Council shall be made public. All decisions shall be in writing.

Board Of Incorporators

The Board of Incorporators, also known as the General Board of Trustees, has the supervision, In Trust, of all Connectional property of the Church and is vested with authority to act on behalf of the Connectional Church wherever necessary.

The General Board

The General Board is in many respects the administrative body and is comprised of various departmental Commissions made up of the respective Executive-Director, the General Secretary of the AME Church, the Chief Financial Officer, the members of the various Commissions, and one Bishop as presiding officer with the other Bishops associating.

Judicial Council

The Judicial Council is the highest judicatory body of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. It is an appellate court, elected by the General Conference, and is amenable to it.

Historical Overview of CDMC

What is now a popular activity, the introduction of young people to society under church auspices, and their dedication to continued Christian service, was inaugurated as a Christian rite of passage by the A.M.E. Church in 1952 and is denoted by the phrase, "The Christian Debutante Master Dedication Commission".

The CDMC originated by Dr. Julma Crawford under the division of Christian Education. The first Debutante-Master Dedication was held May 18, 1952, in Chicago, Illinois at the seat of the 34th General Conference of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. The DMC became an official commission by elected legislation enacted at the 39th session of the A.M.E. General Conference held in June 1972 in Dallas, Texas.

The CDMC is a commission of adults comprising a new supportive and supplemental service to youth groups of the Christian Education at each level of the A.M.E. Church.

On July 1, 1972, Mrs. Crawford was elected Administrator of this commission with the rank of General Officer. In 1976, Mrs. Crawford became a connectional officer as the administrator of the newly legislated Debutante Master Commission.

Dr. Julma Crawford retired in 1992. In July 1992 Mrs. Loretta Fields Hill of Austin, Texas was elected the 2nd Connectional General Administrator of the Christian Debutante-Master Dedication Commission. During Mrs. Hill's 16 years of leadership, she created the CDMC Manual and handbook. She also established the Julma Crawford Scholarship as well as the current organizational structure for the program. She is a retired public health educator and an active lifetime member of Grant AME Worship Center, Austin, TX.

Historical Overview of CDMC Continued

In July 2008 during the General Board meeting at the General Conference in St. Louis, Mo., Mrs. Gloria Massey Ward of Memphis, TN was appointed to serve as the 3rd Connectional General Administrator of the Christian Debutante-Master Commission. She is a retired teacher and an active lifetime member at St. Andrew AMEC in Memphis, TN. Mrs. Ward is no stranger to the CDMC Commission. She has served as chairperson of the Julma Crawford Scholarship Committee, coordinator of the Christian Debutante-Master Dedication Ceremony held at the General Conference in 2008 as well as having held the positions of conference and district commissioner in her district (13th).

In July 2016 during the General Board meeting at the General Conference in Philadelphia, PA, Mrs. Lyndajo Watson of Little rock, AR was appointed to serve as the 4th Connectional General Administrator of the Christian Debutante-Master Commission. She is employed by the Secretary of State's Office of the state of Arkansas and an active member at Union AMEC in Little Rock for over 50 years. Mrs. Watson is no stranger to the CDMC Commission. She was the commissioner for the 12th District from 1994-2016, served as chairperson of the CDMC scholarship banquet in 2012 and 2016, and coordinator of the Christian Debutante-Master Dedication Ceremony held at the General Conference in 2002 and 2016. She also served as First Vice President during Mrs. Gloria Ward's tenure.

Purpose and Significance

The Christian Debutante-Master Dedication Commission (CDMC) introduces young people to Christian society and celebrates their transition to adulthood. Through its adult advisors, the CDMC reinforces the work of Christian education by providing guidance and information for relevant study and fieldwork activities. Young people participating in the CDMC have an opportunity to receive regular and special study programs for personal Christian development and creative leadership in the A.M.E. Church.

The CDMC focuses on the period of transition from adolescence to adulthood that many cultures consider a "rite of passage." Young people desire to celebrate and symbolize their new adult status. The CDMC channels this desire that enhances the mission of the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

PART FOUR CONTINUED — ADDITIONAL CDMC CURRICULUM

Purpose and Significance Continued

The Christian Debutante-Master Ceremony is the official activity under the auspices of the CDMC, a solemn religious service whereby the young honorees in their period of transition celebrate their new adult status in the church. It pays tribute to the rites of passage from youth to adulthood. The Debutante-Master Ceremony, the flagship of the CDMC, affords young people, ages sixteen through twenty-two, the opportunity to be introduced to the church society and to dedicate their lives to greater Christian service.

What is now a popular activity, the introduction of young people to society under church auspices, and their dedication to continued Christian service, was inaugurated as a Christian rite of passage by the A.M.E. Church in 1952 and is denoted by the phrase, "The Christian Debutante Master Dedication Commission".

The CDMC originated by Dr. Julma Crawford under the division of Christian Education. The first Debutante-Master Dedication was held May 18, 1952, in Chicago, Illinois at the seat of the 34th General Conference of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. The DMC became an official commission by elected legislation enacted at the 39th session of the A.M.E. General Conference held in June 1972 in Dallas, Texas.
